# Tryout Dates Set For The Music Man by Dennis Szatkowski Sr.

Well, the time is rapidly approaching for tryouts for *The Music Man* and I hope that we will have a large number of people who will come out to try out. This is a BIG show! For the "old timers" in the group, you will remember that we did this show back in 1986 and it was the first show that brought my family into the Tawas Bay Players family. It was a great show then and it still is today. It's a timeless musical and listed by many critics as being among the top musicals of all time. I will be directing the show with Vickie Szatkowski and Judy Quarters producing and I am extremely happy that Jim Sapp will be the Pit Director. Vocal directorship is pending.

This wonderful show is ideal for performers of all ages, from children to older adults and it is an ideal show to cultivate and bring in new members to our community theater family. I am asking everyone to please spread the word to anyone you may know that has thought about trying out for a play but may have just not taken the step to do so. There will be at least 10 principal speaking roles for men; 7 for women; 2 for boys and 3 for girls with additional needs for children, men and women townspeople/chorus members. I'm thinking we will need between 35 to 40 people in the cast. My son Dennis was 7 when he was given his first child lead role of "Winthop" and I hope to find another boy of about that age for the role this time too. If you know of a young boy who can sing and act a little... please encourage him to tryout and let me know too!

I have to work around a busy theater schedule so the tryout dates and times will be: Friday, February 8<sup>th</sup>: Children 6:00-7:30 p.m. and Adults 7:30-9:00 p.m. Saturday, February 9<sup>th</sup>: Children 12:00 noon to 1:30 p.m. and Adults 1:30-3:00 p.m. Show dates will be May 10-12 and 16-19 with the possibility of a couple added shows if needed.

# **Orchestral Addition Complete by Keith Frank**

Our long awaited dream of an Orchestra Pit has become a reality. Well sort of. Because of the difficulties with space requirements, etc. to construct an actual "pit", the Tawas Bay Players board opted instead to construct an "orchestral wing" off of the main stage. The area is 10' deep by almost 20' wide and the walls and ceiling are paneled with acoustical tiles. From this location, the musicians can now see what is happening on stage throughout the performance. By being in an area that never before existed, the pit is off stage and no longer has to take up valuable stage space during productions. And, if anyone saw the performances of *Quilters*, they really looked good. Dressed in theme costuming, they looked like they were part of the cast, as they in fact are.

The TBP board began planning in earnest in the fall of 2011. Members of the board met with Russo Engineering in the early fall to see whether an actual "pit" was even an option. As it turned out it was but at over twice the cost. The decision was made to go with a "wing" instead. Russo Engineering drew up preliminary plans and presented them to the board in November. Throughout the winter of 2011 and spring of 2012, many meetings were held. It was during one of these meetings that the decision was made to add an enclosed hallway that would go from back stage all the way down to the Newman/Lincoln street foyer. This addition would allow cast and crew to go from back stage to the back of the house without having to go outside of the building. Plans were finalized and the project went to bid in June 2012. The low bidder on the project was Lake Shore Construction (Barry Schley) at a cost of \$68,385.00. Russo Engineering followed up on Lake Shore's references and on July 23, a special board meeting was held to award the bid to Lake Shore Construction.

With an October 1 deadline, construction started almost immediately. During the construction period it was decided that, since *Quilters* included a musician in a wheel chair, we needed to add handicap access for cast and crew. Barry said he would donate the labor if TBP purchased the materials. We did and Barry added the exterior handicap ramp and access door. We also made some changes to the orchestral room and hallway lighting during this period. Several changes were made that added to the final cost of the project but there were several more minor changes that were made during this period with Barry doing them at no additional charge as long as TBP paid for the materials. All in all, the final bill for Lake Shore Construction came in at \$71,360.00. We also decided to carpet the new hallway and entire back stage area and Lincoln street hallway. This added an additional \$2,050.00 to the project. Engineering costs were \$8,060.00 which included all of the drawings, bid documents and project oversight. All in all, the entire project cost came out to \$82,237.60.

So, if you have been a longtime member of Tawas Bay Players as I have, it's nice to see that our dream of an orchestra area has finally come to fruition.

# Creating a World by Alicia Sgambelluri

As a less mature member of the players, I often find myself in the position of trying brave, new things that some of the long-standing members may think are not necessarily appropriate, accomplishable, or even sane. To these comments, I respond, "Anything is possible." As a fresh post-college director, I find myself being looked at as ambitious by my peers and advisors for choosing a show that is set in a fictional and imaginative world with a book that is 90% music. To these comments I say, "I have wings, I can fly." And as a young woman who is working full time, directing, teaching, and planning a wedding, my friends and family think that I am in "over my head." To them I say, "You are probably right, but it's my world, now I have to make it turn."

The world of Dr. Seuss is a whimsical fantasy world of talking animals, bold color, and imaginative architecture. It is a challenge as a director to find a creative way to address this world and put it onstage within the constraints of a theater building that has little space for moving scenery. It is also a challenge to populate a world of such imagination with our community's small number of young (albeit talented) actors and actresses. However, the group of teens I am working with bring life to the tiny stage world of my imagination in ways I hadn't even dared to think.

As a person in my twenties, I find that I can relate to my young performers in a way that many other directors cannot, as I am fewer years removed from my high school career than many who direct, and don't yet have children of my own. I clearly remember a time a few years ago when I took the stage alongside my friends to perform *Once upon a Mattress*. I remember thinking that it was hard work, but fun, so much fun, to create a world on stage that got me away from the hustle and bustle of high school. I love that I have the chance with *Seussical* to let this current group of young Thespians have a part of creating that.

As we began rehearsals at the beginning of November, I could see the light of anticipation in the eyes of my young cast as they remembered the beloved Dr. Seuss stories from their childhood while they sang through the peppy, energetic music. And now, as we prepare to begin the staging of the music that the teens have worked so hard on these last three months, I see the sparks of creativity beginning to jump (Literally in the case of my Wickersham brothers!). I see them

trying on their costumes and beginning to move the way their characters might. I see them looking at the model of my scenic design and imaging themselves placed upon it. At times like this, I realize that I have helped them create the world they see, and it brings me great joy.

It has yet to be seen if the scenic world of my imagination will come to life, as of the writing of this article anyway. But I see it, and I see all of the other pieces of the world fitting together. It's exciting, colorful, and full of new things that TBP haven't seen before. I assure you, dear readers; it will be colorful and full of life and things that the players won't expect. Regardless of all of these things, I am excited and happy to share this new world of imagination and all of my "thinks" with you!
