## A "Sleeper" Hit! By Michal Jacot

Congratulations to the cast and crew of *Sleeping Beauty* for a terrific show! Packed houses and standing ovations seemed to be the law of this fairy tale land, and they were all well deserved.

Any show based on a story that everyone knows always carries a risk, and especially so for those fairy tales that are ingrained in everyone's minds since childhood. The audience knows how the story goes, and they know how it ends. So the trick is to offer a script that provides enough of a twist to keep people entertained while still staying true to the beloved original story. This script kept the audience's attention, among other ways, with its catchy songs. From the bouncy "Once Upon a Tra La La" to the Elvis-esque "Dance", to the clever lyrics of "I've Heard It All Before", the audience was clearly enjoying the music.

I heard many comments about the beautiful costumes and the set. It is a compliment to the workers involved in these areas that people would approach me at work and mention these things specifically. I wasn't talking about the play, I didn't bring it up; but they knew I was associated with the TBP and they went out of their way to pass on how much they appreciated these touches that brought the fairy tale to life.

Any show is only as good as its cast, and this cast delivered big time! We got a nice mix of new and returning faces, and they all looked like they were having fun. That sense of fun poured over the audience, and we all felt like we were invited to the big party on the stage. That sense of camaraderie can't be faked, and when it happens it's practically a visible being up there.

In addition to the fine acting, I got a kick out of the little touches added here and there by the cast. The swat on the rear from Lilac to keep Daisy in line during her song ... the casual way Wisteria scratched the dragon's head like it was her golden retriever ... the lingering smile Servant Reesie gave the king, and the King's and Queen's reactions to it (a little sub-plot going on there that is left to our imagination) ... the servants squealing and fanning themselves after Prince William's rock and roll number ... the Falcon's feather-ruffling preening throughout the show. Everyone added a little dimension to their character that wasn't in the script, or elaborated on what was there (as with Chris Mundy's befuddled King Stefan).

I think everyone did a great job, but I do want to single out a couple of deserving cast members. Barb Hunter ruled the stage as Wisteria. Barb inevitably hears the jokes about how she always plays the villains; I think it's because she does it so well. But she's no one-note actress; remember, she's given us touching dramatic turns in *Brighton Beach Memoirs*, *Flowers for Algernon*, and *Steel Magnolias*, and made us laugh in *I'll Get My Man* and *Noises Off*, all without playing the villainess. And, by the way, this woman can sing like there's no tomorrow. The other standout in the cast is Tom Fox, who did twice as much in the role of the Prince with half the time he had to work with it. Watching his performance from the audience, there was no way anyone could tell that he fell into this part halfway through the rehearsal process. He caught up to everyone else and delivered a grand performance in a tough role.

Congratulations to everyone involved in *Sleeping Beauty*. Your efforts will live happily ever after with your audiences!

Janie tells of how that came about... It happened that I called and called different people and organizations but couldn't find anyone who could put the pieces together for us. I was at a TBP Board meeting last winter talking about the problem when Tim Haskin said he knew someone who might be willing to take on the project. Tim gave me Marsha Hummel's phone number and I made the call. I was ready to hear "sorry, I just don't have the time, etc, etc" but Marsha said that she would love to. I was so excited. We met at the theater and I gave her the blocks and the layout from the production with the sequence of the pieces. She said that she actually had leftover fabric, some of which matched the fabrics in the blocks. I told her to purchase the backing and other materials needed to make a



queen size quilt. She went to work like a busy bee and within six weeks she called to tell me that it was finished and she even quilted it. It is an unbelievably beautiful quilt. I really, really wanted to keep but as you know I didn't.

Deb handled the actual raffle since Janie had to be out of town and she reports: Sales for the raffle netted a profit of \$1180 for the Players. #### Auditions Set for Women of Lockerbie by Deb DeBois

A mother from New Jersey roams the hills of Lockerbie Scotland, looking for her son's remains which were lost in the crash of Pan Am 103. She meets the Women of Lockerbie, who are fighting the US Government to obtain the clothing of the victims which was found in the plane's wreckage. The women, determined to convert an act of hatred into an act of love, want to wash the clothes of the dead and return them to the victims' families. The *Women of Lockerbie* is inspired by a true story, although the characters and situations in the play are purely fictional. Written in the style of a Greek tragedy, it is a poetic drama about the triumph of love over hate.

Auditions for *Women of Lockerbie* will be held on Tuesday, March 4 and Wednesday, March 5 at 6:30 p.m. at the Playhouse. We need 5 to 7 women, 30 to 70 years old (or older) and 2 men, 30 to 50 years old. Actual age isn't necessary as long as the actors can portray the correct age. Even though the show is set in Scotland, actors will not use Scottish accents. Production dates are May 9-11 and 15-18.

# Standing Room Only (SRO) – It's Not an Option!

It has recently come to my attention that when we have sold all of the seats at a performance, people have been allowed to stand in the back to watch the show (SRO). Not only was it discussed at one of our recent board meetings, but it was brought to my attention by a City Council member who was in attendance on one of the occasions. Usually the people standing are TBP members who may have ushered at that evening's show or are serving refreshments at intermission. In some cases, they have been family members of the cast. All of our members need to be reminded that standing in back of the theater is not allowed. I'm sure that many of our members may scoff at this but not only is it a violation of the State and Federal fire codes, it also provides grounds for *termination of our lease* with the City. I'd appreciate everyone's cooperation in this matter. Since I am the current president of the Tawas Bay Players as well as the East Tawas City Park Manager responsible for enforcing the terms of the lease, it would be extremely embarrassing to have our lease revoked because of this. If you want to see the show without purchasing a ticket, all members are welcome to attend dress rehearsal at no charge (this will be addressed in a subsequent article). You never know when a member of the City Council, the Park Board or any other City board or commission member will be in attendance at one of our shows. Since **Standing Room Only** is a violation of the terms of our lease with the City, we, the members of the Tawas Bay Players, need to make sure that it does not happen.

#### Problem at the Theater? - Please Tell a Board Member

If you are at the theater and notice a problem of any kind please let a board member know about it. We have had some issues recently that I'm sure someone was aware of (or should have been aware of) but did not report. Last summer the dead bolt lock on the Lincoln Street door (next to the make-up room) was broken. Since this was right around the time that our summer show was taking place, someone must have been aware of it when they locked that door at night. It was an easy fix but, until someone finally reported it, the door was not lockable and anyone could have accessed the theater.

Another issue was with the November water bill of over \$230.00. When Pat checked with the City, they came over and re-read the meter. It was a correct read, that much water was used. We discovered that the flapper value on one of the toilets would not close and water just kept pouring through. Since whoever is in the building last is responsible for making sure the doors are locked and the bathroom lights are out, this problem should have been discovered. It could have easily been fixed by just jiggling the toilet handle. Instead, it resulted in an enormous water bill.

Another problem was the fog machine and strobe light. When they were needed for Sleeping Beauty, the crew discovered that they were broken. Whoever used it last must have known they was broken but, again, it wasn't reported. So please, if you notice a problem of any kind at the theater, be sure to let one of the board members know about it. To make it easy for everyone we have posted the Board Member contact information next to the phone in the kitchen. None of the issues listed above required a lot of work to remedy, but they could have (and did in the case of the toilet) cause major issues for the entire organization. Thank you for your assistance.

# **TBP Membership and You**

Membership in the Tawas Bay Players is growing at a pretty steady pace. June reported at our November board meeting that we currently have 165 paid memberships. June stated that we have never had that many members going into December before. This is really great. But the thing that is not so great is that, with 165 members, we are not getting very many members actually working on our shows. It seems that we always have the same "core" members doing the bulk of the work required to run the organization. We are also finding that some of our members join just to be able to attend dress rehearsals to see the shows for free. Although this is a great benefit, it should not be the only reason that someone joins the group. Although it is not a requirement of membership, we do ask all of our members to please try to help out at the theater at least once each year. Assistance can be in the form of working on one of our shows (since our shows are in production year around, it shouldn't be hard to find time to help with one of them). There are countless jobs to be done for every show and many are as simple as serving refreshments, providing a couple dozen cookies for refreshments or acting as an usher. You could also take part in one of the scheduled work/cleaning bees or work around the theater (cleaning, painting, etc.). I know that we have members who live out of town and are not able to actively participate, but there are many here in our own community who can. If each member would come forward and help out, there would be a lot less for the "core" group to deal with.

#### East Tawas Sesquicentennial by Keith Frank

To observe its sesquicentennial in 2014, the City of East Tawas City is planning a year-long celebration. The primary celebration will take place August 3 through August 10 and they are asking the Tawas Bay Players to be part of that celebration. There are several areas where they are requesting assistance from TBP.

The Sesquicentennial Committee would like to build a float depicting the history of East Tawas. The float would be entered in local parades throughout the year beginning with the Perchville parade in February. Ideally they will try to find a trailer that they can use for the entire year and construct the float on that trailer, storing it, and bringing it out for each parade. If they are unsuccessful in finding a trailer that they can keep, then they would need to build a float that would be able to be built and taken down for each parade with the float components being able to be re-used each time. They are hoping that TBP members with set construction and set design abilities may be able to assist and recommend the proper way to construct the float.

During the week-long celebration August 3 through August 10, the Committee would like Tawas Bay Player members to act as "Period Interpreters" on the streets downtown during several of the scheduled events. The Period Interpreters would be asked to dress in 1860 era attire and pass out fliers with information about the celebration. Ideally, the Period Interpreters would portray historical figures from East Tawas' past and possibly answer questions about the history of East Tawas.

Also during the celebration week, Michal Jacot has agreed to revive his play, "The Logging Legacy" to be enacted throughout the week long celebration. Michal wrote this play and it was performed at the Lumberman's Monument on two different occasions. We will have more information on the "Logging Legacy" as we get closer to the summer and the actual celebration.

Since the City of East Tawas has been a major benefactor of the Tawas Bay Players since the very beginning, it would be nice if we could "give something back" by helping out with the sesquicentennial.
