The Music Man by Dennis Szatkowski

After nearly 3 months of rehearsals, a very successful run of "The Music Man" came to a close at the end of last Sunday's matinee. Even though we endured a somewhat rocky start, the production evolved into a very fine show and with each performance, I grew prouder and prouder of all the talented cast that made the show great! The newcomers commented how much they loved being involved and I'm sure we will see several of them trying out for future productions. As it is with all shows, emotions were melancholy Sunday as we were all cleaning up and leaving the building saying our goodbyes to one another.

When I suggested repeating this large musical that we originally did 27 years ago in 1986 and when I agreed to direct it, I had 3 main reasons or goals in mind. I am happy to say that I feel all 3 goals were accomplished. My 3 goals were to: do a larger show that would bring new talent of all ages into our theatre group; to do a show that people in our community would be somewhat familiar with and produce sellout crowds; to be successful and therefore profitable to our theatre. The production yielded many newcomers to our stage and several of them have said they want to become members of TBP. I am also sure that we will see many of them on stage again in future shows. We did have sellout crowds at most of our performances and while keeping expenses very low, the show produced a nice profit for TBP.

At the awards dinner following teardown, I presented a brand new award to 3 members in the cast. I had suggested the implementation of this award to the board some time ago and suggested that it be up to the discretion of each director if they wanted to use it or not at the close of future productions. I gave the award a name in honor of one of our long standing, very talented members. My suggestion and intent of the award was twofold. 1). To have a positive reward that directors could give that would recognize the contributions of someone in the cast that "stood out" or contributed positive things in some way. 2). To give it a name in honor of someone in our own group who has contributed so much in their own way. The thought behind it wasn't to necessarily give it to a lead character (although it certainly could be)..... but to give it to someone who really had some real positive effect on the production, in whatever capacity they filled. It could be for acting or it could go to someone who did anything that "stood out" during the course of the show. I suggested the award be called the "Michal Jacot Comedy and Tragedy Award". In suggesting the award, it was never meant in any way to slight, or to diminish any contributions of anyone else who has contributed so much of themselves to our group over the years. I suggested it because of the unique contributions to TBP that I have seen Michal give over the years. I've seen him do roles that made me laugh hysterically and I have seen him in roles that made tears roll down my cheeks, thus, the "Comedy & Tragedy" portion of the title. Being an accomplished actor and playwright and long standing member from the earliest days of the group also prompted me to suggest this award in his name. Well, I was the first director to give the award and actually, I gave it to three members of the cast, not just one. The award was given to Sunny Ragan for always being there and for filling in for numerous members of the cast who were absent at different times and always saying "yes" with a big smile, every time I asked her to help. The award was given to Jane Hackborn, a newcomer to our stage, for her wonderful character and taking a positive lead in many situations. Even though this was her very first time on stage, she was a shining star in the cast and a positive influence on others. The award was also given to Nick Robinson for the outstanding way he took ownership of the many scene changes, in light of the shortages of others to help out. His outstanding dedication to do things right had a huge, positive impact on the show. I hope that other directors in the future will utilize this award to recognize positive contributions in their shows. In closing, I am very proud of the show and of all the people that made it a big success!!!!

Membership Voting by Keith Frank

The board wanted to clarify the bylaws in regard to voting at meetings. As I mentioned last year at the annual meeting, we have not been following our bylaws regarding membership voting requirements. For as long as I can remember, individuals who joined or renewed their membership at the annual meeting could vote at that meeting. However, that practice is contrary to our bylaws. Tawas Bay Player bylaws state:

Section 3. Termination of Membership

The membership of each Tawas Bay Player shall terminate annually at the end of the annual meeting.

Section 4. Voting Rights

4a. Voting shall be restricted to **active** members at the annual meeting or any special meetings called by the Board of Directors. To be eligible to vote, you must be an active member 45 days prior to the meeting.

You must have paid your 2012-2013 dues by July 3, 2013 to be eligible to vote at this year's annual meeting. However, everyone who joins or renews their membership at the annual meeting this year will be eligible to vote next year.

Term Limits by Keith Frank

At this year's annual meeting, one of the things that we will be discussing (and perhaps voting on) is whether or not there should be term limits for the TBP Board of Directors. Tara Western submitted a letter to the Board suggesting that we consider this. I told her that in addition to bringing it to the board's attention, I thought it should also go to the general membership for consideration as well. Our current board agreed so I am including a copy of the letter in this edition of the newsletter. Please take the time to read over Tara's letter and after you read it, think about whether you feel that term limits would be good or bad for the Tawas Bay Players. Then bring your thoughts and any concerns you may have to the annual meeting and we will discuss the idea. Here is Tara's letter:

Dear TBP Board,

Recently I have seen the need for a change in not only my Tawas City Library Friends but also the IADL (losco Arenac District Library) Board, both of which I am involved with. Recently, I resigned from the board of the IADL. I had been on the board for 23 years, and although I enjoyed it, I felt it was time for some new perspectives.

Neither the Friends nor the IADL have term limits. Politically, I don't believe in them. I put my faith in the voting public; wrongly at times......note Detroit and Flint. Usually if a lawmaker needs to go, the voters will see that he or she goes!

But small towns are different. I have been president of the Friends since I started the group in the fall of 2006. While I was in Florida for three months I learned that they can get along without me just fine. Hard for the ego in a way but actually gratifying and freeing. Because of that I am looking into suggesting term limits with the Friends, and I really think that the TBP can benefit from them too.

Organizations need new ideas, fresh perspectives, and new workers. Although we all tend to think we are indispensable, we aren't. I really believe that TBP would benefit from term limits, and I'd like to see the conversation begin this summer, so possibly, a vote to change the bylaws could take place at the annual meeting in August.

For an easy transition, three members could leave the board after serving three years. They could run again after one year, but it would give new members a chance to take their turn.

Ginny McCarthy, Sandy Schorfharr, Vincent Weiler and I took part in the American Association of Community Theater's National play festival. We arrived on Wednesday, June 19 in time to see the first two one-hour cuttings of plays, then ten more through Friday. See below for two articles:

Putting More Butts in the Seats!

Expecting the typical "how to use social media" for new marketing strategies, I was pleasantly surprised by the fresh new ideas that I learned from "Putting More Butts in the Seats, and "Marketing Communications for the Theater." (Note to self: the more boring titled workshop was better!)

I hope to share my knowledge with the Boards of the Tawas Bay Players and Shoreline in the near future, but for now some highlights.

People today, including our patrons, expect more from their entertainment venues: quality, a unique experience and individualized attention. Service, because of present day technology, has become much more personal. Think Facebook, websites etc. that can be tailored to specific needs. People expect not only advertising delivered to them personally but a complete and unique experience, from dinner before to parking to comfort at the theater. When we think of all the competition we face in terms of entertainment, just getting people off the couch is a challenge!

Lots of ideas were shared but in a nutshell, theater groups have to change their publicity focus. Identifying and reaching our audience in small groups (as opposed to the broad brush approach with ads, and flyers) is the future of public relations. Reaching out to our "next best" audience i.e. folks that attend other art/cultural events is one area to explore. In losco County that means our local music, museum, art, library and dance of events. We are very lucky that we have so many groups of this ilk in our small area.

Some ideas for reaching out:

- Read the play at a local library or museum for free. (one in the group did this and I was supposed to find him later and pick his brain, and I never ran into him again....:(
- Early show for the working force. (This one group could only use their venue at 4:30 because of parking---they did a show then and did very well. People liked the fact that they could leave work, see the show, eat afterwards, and still be home in time for "Dancing with the Stars"!)
- "Pay what you can" night
- Invite other non-profit groups to provide refreshments and ushers
- Get email addresses of all patrons and send reminders.
- Free or discounted tickets to bartenders and hair dressers for opening night (who might talk to more people on a daily basis---great word of mouth!)
- Author's note: we talked about the fact that word of mouth is wonderful, but very often, you end up with empty seats the first weekend and SRO the second weekend.
- Have a Pre-glow on opening night with invited guests......serve appetizers and champagne.
- Post rehearsal photos on Facebook and tag new potential audience members.

Whoa! I can hear the nay-sayers: we can't do ______because we______. Or, "we've always done it this way!" Open your mind! Take the idea and think about making the idea work for us!

Leading Ladies – farce, funny, no swearing but needs impeccable timing! Five men, two women, one set. Check out at www.kenludwig.com

God of Carnage – comedy with two couples who each have an 11 year old son. Needs really strong actors! Great physical comedy and dialogue. More info at <u>http://plays.about.com/</u> See author Yasmina Reza.

Tuesdays with Morrie – two men, one to play 30-40 year old, one 60-80 with prodigious memorizing capability. Funny, sad, touching.

Gillian on Her 37th Birthday – two girls to play 16 year old, two men to play 30-50, three women to play 30-50. According to my research, this play was turned into a pretty bad movie! Couldn't find the play!

Maybe you can think of others who help whenever they are asked. These young people may very well be our future board members, directors, producers, set designers and playwrights. How else will we grow as a community theater unless we nurture and teach the young people?

I think that it is vital that we take the time to teach our youth all aspects of community theater. Why not have interns at each position – from directing all the way to tech positions. It would certainly ease the load on the same people all the time.

A community theater dies if it doesn't learn and grow. I don't think that it is a waste of time to teach responsibility and pride in a job well done.

Unable to afford to fix the diner's broken sign or pave the dusty parking lot, the hoped-for customers continue to drive by without stopping. Inside the diner, with failing equipment and dwindling funds, the two couples discover they can't even sell the building for a portion of what they paid for it. They are about to give up in desperation when a handsome, charming stranger walks into their lives. Suddenly, things turn around for them. But they soon find that there are tradeoffs on everything, and everything comes with a price. A moody, atmospheric drama filled with suspicion, tension and chills.
