This whole show has its roots firmly planted in my childhood where every summer found my friends and me putting together a "show" for the whole neighborhood's entertainment and edification...where else could you watch 7-10 year olds lip synching to artists as varied as Nancy Sinatra to Nancy Wilson? We had dance numbers, jokes, skits, and of course music, music, music. I grew up listening to big band and swing music blaring from my dad's stereo in his home office...generally at pretty high volume...while he leaned back in his chair, eyes closed, and tapping his foot in time to the music. At times, we'd moan and groan and complain about his gross taste in music, begging my mom to intercede on our behalf...but somehow, over time, that music grew on me. That era of history became endlessly fascinating to me because of the tremendous courage and sacrifice it took to pull off an intervention of that magnitude. The fact that my dad was a part of it was a source of pride for me, and I only wish I had the foresight to write down the stories he'd share with me whenever I was smart enough to ask. Mom was a die-hard Sinatra fan, so between the two of them, we had lots of albums bulging in the side pockets of the stereo. I've always loved music and singing...probably because my parents did. So when I was 11 or 12 and watched an old movie about The Hollywood Canteen and the USO, I was hooked. I wanted to do something like that someday. In 2011, I got the chance to put on a show again, only this time, it was on a little grander scale, with a few more talented people, but still for a great cause. We had such fun and were able to recreate that spirit of camaraderie so prevalent in that era...for a few nights. That show and this one were (and are) tributes to my amazing dad, Fred Hunter and my Mom, Marie Hunter who lived and loved each other as husband and wife for over 50 years. They raised 7 pretty amazing children, thereby leaving behind a legacy I'm proud to share with others. This show is a thank you for teaching me so well. I sure hope you'll enjoy it for the labor of love it is. Thank you Poppa Fred. I miss you.

Not Bored Being on the Board by Sue Duncan

I didn't know what being a Tawas Bay Players Board member would be like when I was nominated and elected last August. A year later, here I am trying to give a little insight to general members about what being a member of the Board is like, and encouraging you to nominate somebody or to be nominated at the annual August meeting.

The officers do tremendous feats behind the scenes, no pun intended, for all of the members and the community at large. Wow! They work hard for all of us. The monthly meetings tend to run two hours or longer... which was a surprise to me. They are not like the annual meeting, which is always amazingly short. Monthly meetings are spirited, informative and fun meetings, usually. So don't let the time issue scare you away. They are long because there are usually plenty of topics that need consideration and discussion.

Here are two examples of physical changes this year, of which all of us can be proud. The new air conditioning is lovely, but getting it took much research and several meetings with the contractor and the board officers and then the full board to finalize. I would bet Pat Casey and Keith Frank invested about 30 hours. The same is true about the six new additional microphones and the sound system. That project was another 30 hours plus for them. These big-ticket items wouldn't be possible without the Board's careful planning AND money previously earned by members (you!) selling raffle tickets. Speaking of raffle tickets; another Board Officer, Corresponding Secretary Deb DeBois, "lives" in a tent most of the summer selling tickets and helping promote the raffle which is a major money maker for TBP.

The Board considers plenty of other issues and situations besides the physical building. For instance planning the 2014 - 15 season with the guidance of the Artistic Advisory Committee, surveying the membership about term limits, looking at closed circuit TV to replace baby monitors, safety issues with stage lights and of course, paying the bills! You get the idea. This is why the meetings are longer than I expected. At the beginning of this I should've just said, "The Board deals with a lot more than I realized."

My conclusion? It is rewarding to have this opportunity to serve on the Board. I am happy, however, to see each meeting come to an end. There is a lot to think about; my brain gets full! I also feel a sense of satisfaction at being involved in a group where so many people are dedicated to, care about, and have pride in their organization. It was a good decision for me to accept this position. You might think about agreeing to run for a seat on the Board. Perhaps you would be the one to make a difference and a contribution with a long lasting impact on our TBP community and the surrounding communities as well.

2014 Raffle Update



It is hard to imagine that this is our 15th Annual Summer Raffle. This past weekend marked the turning point, we covered all expenses and as of this writing we are \$273 ahead. Of the \$4003 in tickets Deb has sold at this point, only \$650 has come from members' ticket sales. Bob O'Meara is currently our top seller, having just picked up his third set of tickets. Now is the time to really push the ticket sales to friends, family and heck even total strangers! The amount of profit is really in our hands; Deb still has some major events left to attend but if we, as members, could sell all of our tickets we would be in great shape.

Our raffle prizes again this year are a John Deere D-130 Lawn Tractor with bagger, an LG 50" TV and Blu-Ray theater system, a 42,000 BTU Weber Genesis Gas Grill w/ cover, cooking utensils, and grilling spices, and a Cash Prize of \$100 plus Two Season Tickets. Our costs are up by about \$300 this year, due to adding the bagger and increased insurance costs. Tryouts Set for Merry Christmas Dear Grandpa by Michal Jacot

As most of you know by now, our fall play is titled *Merry Christmas Dear Grandpa*. MCDG is a holiday-themed comedy, written and directed by me. And now I will take your questions about the show. Yes, the good-looking person sitting in front of the computer...?

What's it about? Basically, it's about three generations of a family getting together for a Christmas dinner. There's more, of course, but since "family" and "Christmas dinner" are ripe with comedy, I'll let you figure out the rest.



Can I bring my saintly old Aunt Petunia to it? You sure can. It's a family comedy, safe for everyone

How many people do you need for the cast? A total of six, three men and three women.

Is there a part in it for me? Well, since the cast spans three generations, pretty much anyone over 30 has a shot at filling a part. There are three siblings who can be anywhere from 30 to 40, their parents, who can be 55-65, and a senior citizen who can be 80 on up. Makeup works wonders, so don't obsess about the ages.

Is it any good? It was picked up for publication by Eldridge Publishing this past summer. It is a sequel to another play of mine, *Happy Birthday Dear Grandpa*, which has been done in 27 states so far. So they must have some faith in it. And I like to think that it's good, yeah.

When are tryouts? Tryouts are Tuesday and Wednesday, August 12 and 13 at 6:30. If you arrive late, no problem; just be aware that we'll start without you and if we wrap up early you'll miss them altogether, so don't be overly late.

What should I be doing right now? Running to your calendar and marking these dates down. Go ahead, do it. I'll wait.

What should I bring to tryouts? A birthday card, August 12th is June Luv's birthday. Even if she's not there, bring one. Let's show her the love. Beyond that, just be prepared to stand up in front of people and read. Oh, and it wouldn't hurt to bring a list of any potential vacations, out-of-town trips, and other commitments you might have up through mid-October.

I'll be busy both of those nights overthrowing a small South American country. I want to try out, but freedom and democracy comes first. What do I do? Let me know of your interest, and I'll certainly keep you in mind. It's always best if you can physically be there at least one night (both is excellent) to see how you read in various combinations with others. Obviously, those who show up will be first on the list for consideration, but if a conflict in your schedule prevents you from attending, don't let it stop you. Just let me know and I'll see what I can do.

Can I come to the first night of tryouts, ask to take a script home, promise to bring it back the next night, and then never show up again? That would be a no. In fact, we won't even have scripts at tryouts, so don't bother asking.

What do you mean you're not going to have scripts at tryouts? Just show up and find out, okay?

I go to pro wrestling matches with Aunt Petunia every Thursday night. If you're planning on rehearsing on Thursdays, does that mean I won't be considered for a part? Nope. It just tells me that if I want you in a part badly enough, I'll make the adjustment. The important thing is to let me know of conflicts at tryouts; I'll do my best to work around everyone's schedules.

When are production dates? Production dates are October 10, 11, and 12 and October 16, 17, 18 and 19. Check your calendar to see if you're available. It's a real drag when you realize halfway through rehearsals that you've scheduled that South American overthrow thing on one of those weekends.

Who else is working on this thing? I am pleased to announce that Sue Duncan has agreed to be my Assistant Director and Judy Quarters will be my producer. Trust me; I only surround myself with competent and fun people, so this production will be drama-free.

What can I do to irritate you? Come to tryouts, get cast, then call me the next day and say you can't take the part because of a conflict you already knew about. Really, if you can't do the time, don't do the crime. Don't try out if you can't commit to the rehearsals.

What's so special about this show? Because it has only recently been published, there is a very good chance that ours will be the first production of this published script in Michigan, and possibly the first production *anywhere*. Being in the cast and crew of a world premiere is always good for bragging rights. Plus there's always the "local author" thing, which is good for our town.

What if I throw up when I get in front of people? I'd advise against trying out. Instead, work behind the scenes; see Judy to find out what you can do. It's a pretty simple script, production-wise; nothing too outlandish or outrageous. We're talking Theatre Lite - all the fun of working on a show with minimal work.

What kind of rehearsal schedule are we looking at? I'm looking at the traditional three nights a week schedule. Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays are anticipated but not written in stone. I will start rehearsals at 6:30; the acts are all fairly short so I don't see a lot of late nights happening.

I want to have fun. Do you promise I'll have fun? When I direct a show I do my best to make sure everyone enjoys the experience as much as possible. A happy cast and crew radiate that feeling to the audience. Keep in mind, though, that alcohol will not be permitted at rehearsals or productions (I don't want you to be that happy).

The script is funny; why aren't you this funny in real life? You have to pay me.

My question wasn't on the list! Stop whining and just call me at 362-4765 for any other information.

New Air-Conditioning Units + Heat by Pat Casey

After many, many years of sweltering in the theater for our summer productions (and sometimes spring), the board voted to put in new air-conditioning units. What a difference! Before we would turn on the air and let it run for days on end and it still wouldn't cool down the theater. AND for those of you that have been onstage it felt like you were in the tropics! Plus the cost of running the old unit was astronomical! These new units cool the theater down literally in a matter of minutes and should prove to be very cost efficient. I guess we'll find out when we get our first bill but that's what we were told. There are three units - two in the theater and one onstage. All can be controlled separately. Even the tech booth and the "pit" cooled down! We actually had people tell us it was too cool in the theater! We will get it figured out. Our other problem was heating the theater in the winter. The units in the theater (not onstage) are also heating units. Again, should be much more cost efficient than our old system. The old system still heats/cools the rest of the building but that was never a problem. The long ductwork runs to the back of the theater have been an issue from the get go. The board did a lot of research and spent many hours trying to find a solution. Hopefully, we have succeeded!

Saturday, May 24, 2014 was a gorgeous day, warm and sunny for the parking lot filled with vendors. All proceeds will be used for tools and supplies we need for the theater and the extras that would just be nice to have. Over the course of preparations for the play, many new ideas were exchanged about plays, directing, costumes, and set construction. I personally was given a young intern by the name of Jerlisa Culpepper, age 19, from Jackson, Mississippi, to work with and teach the art of painting cardboard to make roof shingles for the farm house. She learned quickly and took over my job and finished it!

Jessica French with assistance from the Oscoda Rotary Club produced a showcase performance of her talented singers with a Disney song review at the band shell at the Oscoda beach park on the Saturday afternoon prior to the performances of *Oklahoma*. Many of the singers were theater professionals and sounded amazing!

Even if you've seen a play before, it always pays to see how someone else does it. I always enjoy seeing how a play is staged, the design and costumes. I always learn something. Never be afraid to see any production by this fine group of people. I truly enjoyed the whole experience and look forward to helping again next summer with their production of *Annie*.
