We had a lively discussion about where to hold our annual meetings (the other option being a sit-down dinner at a local restaurant). Pros and cons of both were brought out and in the end we decided to keep the picnic format for next year. The attendees elected two new board members, Michal Jacot & Sharon Langley and re-elected Chris Mundy. As always, the meeting was topped with the presentation of the Founders Award. Last year's winner Mary Ann Michalski presented this year's pin to Penny Zacharias. Penny will be officially inducted on Halloween night during a midnight full-moon ceremony where we sacrifice a chicken. (Just wanted to see if you were reading this far.)

It's not a stereotypical boring business meeting; the proceedings are always upbeat and involving, and keep us all up-to-date on what's happening with our group. Directors are invited to present their selection to the Board and the AAC. However, any member (whether director certified or not) who has a suggestion for a play is invited to attend and make a presentation as well. Members (and directors) should be prepared to give a brief synopsis of the play, number of cast members required (male, female, children, etc.) and, if possible, bring a copy of the script to the meeting. At the end of the meeting, the AAC will evaluate each play to determine if it would be a good choice to add to our next season. Final decisions on play selection for the next season will be made by the Board. This meeting will also be held at the Playhouse beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Please come out to these meetings so that you can be aware of what shows are up for consideration.

#### The Play's the Thing by Tara Western

Next year's fall CTAM conference in Cadillac will be all about "putting on the play": play writing, play selection, marketing your season as well as acting, directing and the technical side of theatre. Why are you telling us this, Tara? I mean, that is almost a year away! Well, here's the deal. CTAM is having a Ten-Minute Play writing contest. Due date is May 25, 2015. So, sharpen your pencils, and unclick your pens! Some tips, keep it simple! Only 2-3 characters, a single simple set, and a single time frame. The plays will be produced that weekend!

#### Readers' Theater by June Hudgins

Quite a lot of us went to the CTAM convention in Cadillac and we are each going to report on some of the workshops that we took. One I took was Readers' Theater. I took a session a few years ago on the same subject and got some Readers' Theater books and things to get started with. It is a very easy thing to do, no learning of lines. You just read from the script. We need music stands and stools to sit on. Readers wear nice black pants and the same color shirts, black works really well.

A lot of Readers' Theaters perform strictly for seniors, but you don't have to. Readers' Theater groups go to many venues, senior centers, libraries and other small gatherings, for 15 minute to 1 hour shows. We do not charge for the shows but are allowed to take donations.

If any of our members would like to do this I would be happy to help and get started on this project. There are a lot of folks who cannot learn lines, but would still like to do something like this. It is a lot of fun and not a lot of work to do Readers' Theater. #### Costumes and Make Up and Wigs, Oh My! By Sue Duncan

Joy Butler, a retired professional costumer and make-up artist gave a wealth of safety information at the fall CTAM conference. The heart of this topic is the same as in a good kitchen. Keep It Clean and Keep it Safe. That is the on-going focus and the final goal of healthy, incident and hopefully, accident free performances!

Costumes and Wigs - If it is washable it may need to be washed every time it is used. For example: stocking caps in the summer. Wig 'caps' need to be washed and air-dried after each use during any season. Baby shampoo, Dawn dish soap, vinegar or baking soda is the recommended substances for cleaning. Fabric softener is NOT recommended on washables as it makes the fabric less breathe-able.

Dry clean costumes only when necessary and be sure to "air" the dry cleaned clothes well, then store them uncovered. Dust coverings should be of cloth, not plastic. Keep costume and wig storage areas dry and well ventilated.

When creating a costume one needs to consider how to create good vision conditions and body coverings that allow safe movement. Think safety first. Plastic bags do not make good costumes; so ditch that idea involving garbage bags!

Make-Up is NOT for sharing. Not lipstick or mascara or base or anything! Use throwaway sponges on your face and rubbing alcohol to clean dispensers. Clean hands, face, work area and make up will go a long way to cutting down on pink eye, fever blisters, colds etc. A good moisturizer helps protect your skin and allows the base make up to adhere more evenly. If you have allergic conditions to consider, be sure to 'test' the substances you'll be putting on your face or hands well before dress rehearsal.

If you use brushes for make-up don't clean them with acetone. Wash them with baby shampoo, Dawn dish soap, vinegar or baking soda. According to Joy, these substances will clean everything except oil-based paint. It may just require a bit more elbow grease to do so.

## Big Show- Small Stage (Instructor Leeds Bird) by Diane Ray

Do you think the "big" shows are out of the question for our small theatre? I know we have said that we just can't stage this one or that one because it's too "big". Well, we learned to rethink big shows and learned to take a new look at our theatre's possibilities. It's all in the way we look at things.

Look at going up, fly whatever you can; use elevations, design them into the set. Use truck wagons, if wing space allows, use several from either side or front to back. Use 3-sided walls, to change the scene, leave one blank and hang on bricks or rocks, or windows and doors that can be removed easily and are light (like cardboard). Use costumes to tell the audience what is happening. Is it raining or snowing outside but you don't want to take up space showing an entire scene of snow or water or ice? Use your actor's costume to set the scene. If he comes through the door closing an umbrella it tells you he just came from the rain. If he is inside and going outside, he may open the umbrella on the way out telling you it's raining outside.

A tricky huge scene can be deleted entirely just by using an actor with the props that might have been in that scene. *Little Women* has an ice skating scene, but you don't have to put it on stage, just have the actors coming back home with ice skates hanging from their shoulders. Use black-outs with sound effects to get the audience to imagine what is happening. A ship's mast is the only thing on stage, you hear thunder and see lightening, and winds, then a sudden blackout, and you hear a loud snap and breaking of lumber; the scene comes back on and you no longer see the ships mast (incidentally then you may use the same mast for the next performances).

My additional idea was to make a miniature of your setting, (like for *The Phantom of the Opera*) to show the audience at the beginning of a scene, then open up to your stage and show just a minimal amount of the key elements for that scene, like a standing candelabra and the Phantoms' chair and a tall mirror. Give the audience credit for using their imagination. You will save a lot of volunteer hours and headaches if you just simplify your set and think about the possibilities of staging a BIG Show!

#### What I Learned at the CTAM Conference and Am Able to Say In Public by Tara Western

Propping a show is fun! Michael Wilson from Grand Rapids Civic was so geeked about making props, I think everyone in the class wanted to go home and make stuff! To create a replica he looked at the object from all angles and thought out of the box. Love to see someone with such passion and fortunately, TBP has those people too! Michael had a very cool grid he used to organize the props for a show. I offered to do this with *Red Velvet Cake Wars*, and Director Sharon Langley has accepted. If it works, I'll share what I learned. Understand, I am NOT doing props, I am organizing them. Also, get this, the director emails a report after every rehearsal to all the backstage crew.....after every rehearsal!!!

P.S. Grand Rapids Civic has offered to loan us costumes, set pieces, and props several times. That is one of the many benefits of attending conferences: really helpful people.

**In Hosting Special Events**, Jill Patchin the editor of the Daily Community Theater Newsletter mentioned many, many ideas, but this one thing resonated: with your volunteers after a big event: Recognize, Reward, Review.

Casual learnings (not in a class!) Tawas Bay Players are the nicest people! The wait staff hugged many of us when we left on Sunday! We had an adorable server who was in love with June's British accent and we turned her into a little Ida, the Cockney maid! I can't party late anymore! The last weekend of September is always hot! That weather should be moved to June! Leeds Bird is hilarious!

Every year at the CTAM Fall Convention, a Scholarship Raffle is held to benefit any CTAM member who wants help with funding trips to the conventions, workshops, and classes that CTAM sponsors. This year many of our TBP attendees were fortunate to win a few of those prizes after buying raffle tickets throughout the weekend conference. (Many of our own TBPers actually sold those raffle tickets all weekend long.)


