


"THE 39 STEPS" CAST

Tina Dalton tells us the story of *The 39 Steps:* A man in London tries to help a counter-espionage agent, but when the agent is killed and the man stands accused, he must go on the run to save himself and stop a spy ring that is trying to steal top-secret information. The mysterious organization called "The 39 Steps" is hot on his trail in a nationwide manhunt that climaxes in a death-defying finale!



The show is a full on parody of the thriller genre, packed with hammy characterizations, amusing visual gags and plenty of cross dressing. One reviewer said "It creates its own storytelling visual language, revels in its theatricality and simplicity of the staging, and moves slickly through the multiple locations and characters. It



sweeps the audience along with a joyous sense of fun and silliness that is hard to resist."

Part Hitchcock, part spy novel, and a bit of Monty Python make up *The 39 Steps*. Show dates are Oct. 11-13 and Oct. 17-20. All shows are at 7:00 p.m. except the Sunday shows, which are at 2:00 p.m.

TBPer Rocks It in "Million Dollar Quartet"



CTAM Fall Conference

Sheila and I were able to attend the CTAM Fall Conference in Midland Saturday Sept. 21. The conference was free to members and included a free lunch funded in part by two sponsors – Ludus and Associated Controls (a sound, lighting and rigging firm in Michigan). It was somewhat less attended than I think they'd have liked, yet networking with other groups was interesting and productive.

Workshops included grant writing, design, playwriting, directing, board development, and a technical session on moving from analog to digital for sound and lighting. In addition, there were several roundtable sessions about community support, marketing, "where are all the young people", and hits and misses (shows and other events that have gone well or bust).

While the discussions were inspiring, I found it difficult to translate some of the information to our theater since the next smallest community represented was Players De Noc from Escanaba — with a community and membership 3 times ours. Nevertheless, I know from my career that if you can take away one new contact and one new idea, it's a win. I made many new contacts (this group is exceptionally welcoming), and hope next year I can join some of them to take in a show after the conference.

It is difficult in a short article to capture a lot of lessons learned from an all day event. Here are a few tidbits we learned that may apply to our theater.

Design – starting very early provides the time needed to have a top notch show. Design includes Set, Lighting, Costumes and Sound at a minimum, and at least 2 pre-production meetings to work through design ideas is important to do well before casting even begins. Theaters should develop design talent in addition to directors and other roles, and those groups where the designer is not the director often have a true focus on design.

In the technology area, moving to LED lighting and digital controls can have a payoff in as little as 2-1/2 years when switching from incandescent. Making a move is often jumpstarted when the current aging technology begins to fail. Interestingly, groups that move from analog to digital sound find no improvement if they aren't first looking at their microphones (for groups that amplify their actors). The move to digital sound does make sense when (a) there is a desire to have operators run sound with little more than a "go" button instead of manipulating all the manual controls, (b) when finer equalization is needed on a per channel basis (a digital board can have 30+ EQ settings), and (c) your venue has multiple groups and shows working in the same space – each can save their show and not need (continued on next page)

to depend on tape or diagrams to set the board up each day. However, a digital sound board does not simplify sound design – all the same talents and techniques apply.

The community engagement roundtable was primarily around soliciting funds and we discussed the subtle but important differences between sponsorships .vs. paid ads. One key to retain sponsorships was to not over-promise, and to keep any promises made. I also had a chat with the Ludus co-owner regarding their module for "campaigns" as a way to manage fundraisers.

For the "Where are all the young people" roundtable, a few things resonated regarding getting them to participate/audition. Facebook is old school, most of them use Instagram and/or TikTok (plus podcasts and YouTube). Younger people may be more apt to audition based on the reputation of the director as opposed to the show. Being able to submit an audition video when unable to attend the audition nights may help. Providing a list of audition songs is important to them, and if there is a dance portion, having a YouTube video of it in advance is a big help.

The Grant session was interesting in part because they discussed some positive changes to grant applications, especially the MACC (Michigan Arts and Culture Council) application. A key recommendation was to get all the "cover" information together in a folder – who we are, structure, mission, etc. such that when a grant come up, you can focus on the specific request. They recommended asking for as much money as possible. Grantors may give you less, but will never offer more than asked for. Also, Ludus has features to manage volunteer hours, which are considered "in kind" contribution toward the project – very helpful for grants requiring the organization to have a stake in the project.

Certainly there was much more discussed than can be captured in a summary or newsletter article, and meeting like minded people struggling with (or finding solutions for) similar issues our group faces is why they put on these events. I urge everyone to consider attending the next event. It is well worth the drive (and a free lunch to boot!).

One last nugget – CTAM has an "on the road" program to bring training directly to an organization. Funding is shared between CTAM and the organization, and the workshop can be tailored to fit our theater's specific needs. After all, they can tap the expertise of many member organizations! I can already think of a few things we might explore with them – perhaps you can too! Let a board member know what you'd like to see in the coming year.


Online Membership Now Available
