
You all know the classic whodunnit story, there has been a murder at a country manor and an inspector is set on the case to find who the culprit is.

### **Adjudication 101**

Compared to many members, I'm a newbie who is still learning the ropes in theater productions and experiencing the many facets of production success. Despite my semi-rookie status, I do realize that, similar to businesses and other non-profit organizations, improving and moving forward are critical in order to thrive.

Having stated that, I believe that the saying "You can teach an old dog new tricks" certainly applies to our theater and adjudication. Although some may be off-put by judgements, my personal belief is that being observed and evaluated by a trained, objective person is vital for growth.

As a teacher for over twenty-five years, I was

evaluated twice yearly during my tenure. There were times that I may not have agreed with the assessments, but I certainly appreciated the well-intended suggestions for improvement. Yes, as I reflect back, those observations made me a better educator.

During *The 39 Steps*, our cast and production crew agreed that adjudication was important; as a result, this was a great decision. In the past, I observed adjudicators stating, "You do not need to change anything now. My observations are simply from my history of theater experience..."; I appreciated that statement, so personal and professional offenses were not taken.

Our adjudicator's feedback was incredibly positive and helpful. Mary Jo Denolf, CTAM administrator, even wrote an article and highlighted our playhouse in the November Callboard (see below-Page 4).

Additionally, during that feedback, Mary Jo mentioned that because TBP highly encourages adjudication, we were an inspiration, as there have been a number of community theaters in metro-Detroit and Grand Rapids who now have included adjudication in their productions.

Overall, we are thriving, AND we are influencing others! Shoutout to all the cast, directors, and producers who are hardworking, open-minded, and forward thinking!

# Adjudication is alive and well in Michigan...



... and we have exciting news to share with you about its future. First, I am taking over chairing the Adjudication program as Larry Nielsen decided it was time to pass the torch after many years of faithfully keeping the program alive and well. We cannot possibly thank him enough for his time and experience leading this vital CTAM program. Thankfully, he will continue as an adjudicator for us.

Second, thanks to a generous grant from the MACC and the NEA we are able, at least for the time being, to pay mileage for all adjudicators to travel to your shows, and **CTAM will now pay \$50 for all adjudications** that take place between now and September 30, 2025. We hope the addition of paying for mileage will enable more adjudicators to travel longer

distances and be available for more shows and that the ability to have this done at no cost, will encourage more groups to give adjudication a try! At least three theaters in the state are looking at having all their shows adjudicated. I will be your in-person session leader at the festivals where all participants will have the opportunity to conduct their own adjudication of at least one of the festival shows for their classmates. Cost of the two part training is \$50 per person and you can choose to come to the training in February or March as space allows. There will be space for no more than 12 participants for each festival, and the training will be opened to all states in our AACT region. CTAM's additional costs will be paid for with grant funds. If you are not familiar with 39 Steps it is a parody play adapted from the 1915 novel by John Bucan and the 1935 film by Alfred Hitchcock. The original concept and production of a four-actor version premiered in 1996 and the adaptation this group performed was 2005 which includes more actors.

Director, Suzan Nemeth, did a fantastic job of working with her cast of 10 (which included the Stage Manager and Asst SM) moving about the stage. Suzan utilized all parts of the stage, theatre and spaces which allowed the audience to feel as if they were part of the production. One thing that I'm very picky on, especially as I get older, is the dialect of a production. I want to hear every word that is said and understand what is being said. Congratulations to this cast. Not only could I hear everyone, I understood everyone and the Scottish dialects were the best ever! (Even when you're not supposed to understand...) understood!) Character development with this group was also outstanding. Fantastic job done by all.

If you have never been to Tawas Bay Players, they go above and beyond from the time you step in the door.
