
Tara Tells You All About It

A LITTLE HISTORY.....



She continued to publish newsletters in April, June, and August of 1981. In September, Michal Jacot took over and put out issues for September, October, November, and Christmas. My favorite thing in his first issue is the "JUNE HUDGINS/TBP NEWSLETTER CORNER."



You see, June liked to use the semi-colon...almost all the time. A few commas might occasionally make an appearance, but in the first issue I cannot find anything but;;;;;;;;;;;s!

Michal went on to continue as editor in chief all of 1982 and 1983 through June of that year. His signature was a comic strip about the TBP called "Bit Parts." He also wrote amazing titles for his articles. My favorites from his first two editions are: "TBP Invade CTAM Convention at Boyne Highlands.....73 people Injured, 206 Still Missing" and "Many People in TBP Need Help." TBP rocked, rolled, and ruled the CTAM conferences in the 80's, so those headlines could have been fairly accurate. And yes, TBP really needed help in so many ways.

That said, the event isn't a lot of work. We greet people at 7 pm, ask who is there to perform, write their name down. We then number the names and pull them from a hat.


Tilly's has hosted three Open Mics, with smallish, but enthusiastic groups.
